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Mayflower is Canceling Events Due to COVID-19



As of Wednesday,

March 11th, Mayflower has closed the Health Center and Beebe Assisted Living to visitors except those that are absolutely necessary.

The Mayflower Community professional staff has discussed the latest developments with COVID-19 ("the coronavirus"). There have now been 14 cases confirmed In Iowa. More cases are expected in the coming days.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has posted new guidance on its website, encouraging older people (60+) and those with underlying health problems to "stay at home as much as possible." Specifically, commercial travel is not recommended. The CDC says older people are twice as likely to become seriously ill if they become infected with the virus. For the latest information from the CDC, dial 211.

Although there is still much unknown about COVID-19, it is believed to be spread person-to-person through droplets. This means that the air will not infect you. BUT, all the surfaces where these droplets land are infectious for about a week on average. Everything associated with infected people will be contaminated and potentially infectious. You will not be infected unless your unprotected face is directly coughed or sneezed into or unless your hands pass it into your nose, mouth, or eyes.

In addition, influenza A and B are widespread in the Grinnell community.

We are all urged to take precautions like regular washing of hands with soap and water and staying home when we feel sick. At this time, Mayflower has adequate supplies of sanitary and cleaning products. Fortunately, germs on surfaces can be killed with normal cleansers.

Now, for the good news! At this time, Mayflower does not deem it necessary to close the Obermiller Center (lower level of the Health Center). It is cleaned regularly by staff. In addition, users are asked to wipe down any equipment they will be touching and to use hand sanitizer upon departure.

Guest rooms are still available. However, guests will be assessed on health information and point of origin before staying at Mayflower Community.

If there is an event you are/were planning to attend, try to check with the organizer, as it has most likely been cancelled or postponed at this time.

Mayflower Independent Living Kitchen Tour



On Tuesday, March 3rd, The Mayflower Community provided tours of the Buckley kitchen to residents and invited guests.

This was an opportunity to see how Mayflower has converted the Buckley Dining Room to the new "Open Dining" concept as the result of modifications to the prep kitchen. As a result, meals are available daily from 7:00am to 6:30pm. Breakfast is served all day long. Beginning at 10:30am the full menu and grill menu are available for the rest of the day.

For the tour event, light refreshments of egg rolls, pizza, and cookies were provided right out of the Rational® combi oven. Gooey,

warm, delicious chocolate chip and chocolate macadamia nut cookies!

The tour started at the north end of the kitchen, near Scott Gruhn's office, and wound through the baking tables, the prep areas, and the cooking equipment into the storage area and out via the refrigerator and freezer. Food Service staff explained the various kitchen functions.

Scott Gruhn guided the visitors through the process of preparing multiple dishes at the same time in the combi oven with support from other new equipment.

The final stop was the J&B Bistro where updated information was presented about the plans for converting the Beebe Assisted Living into a full Open Dining kitchen. Beebe will be the last step in this process as the Health Center kitchen was the first to be remodeled and is now serving a full Open Dining menu.

Now, we know how that new varied menu of choices is produced quickly and delectably.

Middle Way Farm is an organic vegetable farm run by Jordan Scheibel since 2013. Jordan leases land from the Lacina family just north of Grinnell. Middle Way Farm offers Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) shares, which are weekly or every other week boxes of fresh, high quality, seasonal produce delivered from June through October. The farm served around 90 CSA customers in 2019, including 15 Mayflower residents who picked up from the drop site along Mayflower Lane above the dining hall patio on Wednesday afternoons.



In addition to talking about the farm and

the process of raising organic vegetables, Jordan will be specifically presenting about the unique opportunity he provides for customers to sign-up for a completely customizable CSA share, in addition to his traditional "farmer's choice" CSA share. Custom share members can choose what they get in their box each week and are not obligated to order every week. The custom share provides the choice of picking out produce at the farmers market with the convenience of a pre-packed and delivered box of produce.

Jordan will also provide paper brochures at his presentation which can be used as sign-up forms. There will also be a special \$25 discount available for Mayflower residents who attend the presentation and decide to sign-up for CSA share on the spot or afterward.

Mayflower Receives Raised Flower Beds

On Friday, March 6th, youth and advisors who are part of the Malcom-Sheridan Youth and After School Program delivered to The Mayflower Community four raised gardening beds. They were built by the young people under the guidance of program director, Dawn Hamilton.

The beds are made of treated cedar wood and were delivered with plastic liners. They are four feet high, the recommended height for use by less-abled gardeners, including those using wheelchairs.

The materials were purchased with the proceeds of a grant from the Poweshiek County Alliance. The grant sponsor was the Malcom United Methodist Church. The youth performed the construction work in the Malcom-Sheridan United Methodist Church, located between Brooklyn and Grinnell, north of Malcom.



The four raised beds were delivered to The Mayflower Community's shared garden, located between Broad and Park streets, on the north side of 2nd Avenue. Mayflower plans to keep two of the beds in this garden and move the other two to accessible locations just outside the Beebe Assisted Living building and Health Center building.

Meeting weekly, the Malcom-Sheridan Youth After School Program offers a place for 25-35 students from the Malcom, Brooklyn, Grinnell, and Montezuma to eat and engage in activities, crafts, and service projects.

The Mayflower appreciates this kind gift from Dawn and her youth along with the assistance of the Poweshiek County Alliance.
