Giving Thanks at Mayflower

Thanksgiving Day 2020 in The Mayflower Community was full of appreciation, even with all the struggles of 2020. The highlight was the home-delivered meals to Mayflower residents. Independent living residents ordered 125 specially prepared turkey and ham dinners with all the fixins. Health Center and Beebe Assisted Living residents dined with the same menu.



Food Service Director, Scott Gruhn, reminisced on this, his 25th Mayflower Thanksgiving dinner. He recalls the first one he oversaw in 1989 when residents and their guests dined on eight-foot Monroe tables in a space about half the size of the current Buckley Dining Room. Over the years, the space expanded and became grander with carpeting and cherry wood decor.

Scott has served as Mayflower's Food Service Director, first from 1989 to 1993 and now from 2000 to the present.

This year...Write off the in-person Thanksgiving meal! Out of precaution, no meals were served in the Dining Room.

But, oh the food! The diners' reports were uniformly favorable. After asking which restaurant prepared the delivered meal and being told that it was the Mayflower Kitchen, one resident observed, "How do they do it?! It was delicious!"

Another resident wrote this thank-you note this morning: "Thank you for the staff's delicious Thanksgiving dinner. I've written Scott, noting Mayflower's special dinners are ALWAYS special, but am aware that this year dealing with restrictions of the coronavirus, the entire project was extra challenging. And, a special thank-you for all who delivered the dinners. Everything was delicious.....and as a single, I not only enjoyed Thanksgiving Day noon dinner, but also leftovers for supper AND for lunch the following day. I love leftovers, especially food prepared by Scott and his staff."

Residents John and Dorothy Noer wrote this morning that the dinner was "not surprising, but very delicious. It was tasty and filling. Hot food was hot and cold was cold." John and Dorothy went on to report, "There were fifteen adults, two preschoolers, and seven dogs at our Thanksgiving get-together on Thursday evening. We ate, conversed, and played games for three

hours. It was great to see family we hadn't been with for quite some time."

John went on to write (before we could panic about the large crowd in a confined Mayflower space!), "By the way, we were in the following locations: Grinnell, Boston, Park Forest IL, Bourbonnais IL, Sullivan MO, Gulf Port MS, and Taiwan. It was a zoom gathering!"

Establishing new routines in this difficult period is critical to staying upbeat!

"Human Needs" and Other "Funds" Facts

From January 1, 2008 to the present, 4,095 gifts totaling \$821,270 have been contributed to the Mayflower Foundation's "Human Needs Endowment Fund" (HNEF). (Note: I share these specific statistics because generous contributions to this fund prior to 2008 were not recorded in a permanent donor database.)

Serving Residents in Need

Donors to the HNEF provide care for Mayflower residents whose funds are exhausted. The HNEF is an endowmentfund held by the Mayflower Foundation with a current balance near \$1,900,000. The Foundation invests your HNEF gifts and makes an annual distribution to Mayflower for resident care.

A second HNEF was established with the Greater Poweshiek Community Foundation in recent years and has a current balance near \$500,000. This fund gives Iowa taxpayers the unique opportunity to support Mayflower residents in need while benefiting from an "Endow Iowa" tax credit.

Mayflower's VISION is to see the collective balance of both "Human Needs" endowments reach

\$8,000,000. At this level, annual distributions of \$400,000 would fully support Mayflower's average annual costs to care for residents with financial need. I welcome a conversation if you wish to explore this visionary opportunity.

A gift to Mayflower's "Residents Assistance Fund" (RAF) is another way to help residents with financial need. The RAF is not an endowment; your gift is fully spent in the year it is received to care for residents.

Other "Funds" Facts

The Mayflower Foundation holds three funds in addition to the HNEF. Your gift(s) to any of these will similarly support Mayflower residents or staff.

The Mayflower Employee Education Fund (MEEF)

An endowment fund with annual distributions providing educational and advancement opportunities for Mayflower staff.

· The Montgomery Church Leaders Fund (MCLF)

An endowment fund with annual distributions supporting the housing needs of retired clergy.

· The Mission and Vision Fund

A non-endowment fund with a current balance near \$2,000,000. Though not an endowment, the fund is invested and annual distributions are used to care for residents in need, or for projects that benefit all residents or staff. Mayflower's VISION is to see this fund grow to \$5,000,000 and distribute \$200,000 annually in support of resident and staff wellness initiatives.

All other charitable "funds" at Mayflower are established to accomplish special projects that benefit residents or staff. A current "special project" is the Open Dining renovation planned for Beebe Assisted Living. Throughout 2020, generous gifts were received to help with derecho damage and PPE and COVID-19 testing supplies. In recent years, gifts to special project funds made possible: a) Open Dining renovations in the Health Center and Buckley Dining Rooms, b) the Obermiller (fitness) Center, c) numerous campus gardens, d) resident transportation vehicles, and many others.

As year-end approaches, your support will be impactful. Gifts of cash (checks) are always welcome, or a quick "gift planning" conversation might uncover alternatives that provide you extra benefits. I welcome hearing from you; any conversation we have is without cost or the obligation to make a gift.
