So, how was the Symphony? That question was asked on Friday, February 12th in Grinnell's Mayflower Community. Making arrangements to "attend" the Des Moines Symphony virtual-streamed performance on Thursday evening, February 11th, Mayflower offered up an appetizer and wine selection accompaniment.

Entitled "Past and Present," the Symphony performance was a study in historical and current pieces from Haydn and Saint-Georges to Jessie Montgomery's modern, multicultural tribute to "The Star-Spangled Banner."

The Mayflower tasting menu was an appetizer and dessert box including smoked salmon napoleon with crème fraiche; stuffed cherry tomato with feta, bacon, and green onion; and topped off with flourless chocolate cake under a rosemary ganache. The two different wine pairings complementing the menu were Chenin Blanc and Chianti.

Sampling and viewing took place in about 30 Mayflower households.

Most often, this column focuses on specific gift planning tools and techniques, with suggestions that we sift through the "good, better, and best" ways to put sound charitable strategies into action. (This is a good time to remind you that Mayflower provides my assistance to you no matter which organizations you desire to support.)

Many of you have followed your heart and touched Mayflower residents and employees with your generosity. I know those folks (and their family members) extend you their heartfelt gratitude. Whether you are a many-time donor or considering your first gift, this seems a good time to share reminders of how you might follow your heart if it leads you to Mayflower residents or its caregivers.

The primary charitable mission of Mayflower is providing housing and/or healthcare to residents, who, through no fault of their own, have outlived their resources. Imagine the blessing you give a resident and their family by providing the services they can no longer afford. If this is your charitable passion, your gift to Mayflower's "Residents Assistance Fund" will be spent directly to serve residents. Or, you may choose the "Human Needs Endowment Fund," where your gift is invested to provide income that supports residents year after year.

For seventy-one years, Mayflower has responded and adapted to the needs of its residents and caregivers. If your passion is new and innovative resident services, Mayflower's "Mission and Vision Fund" is a solid choice. If supporting caregivers with educational and advancement opportunities is your passion, consider the Mayflower Employee Education Fund (MEEF). Both funds are held as endowments, spending annual earnings to enhance the lives of residents and staff.

Each year, passionate Mayflower donors support one or more campus enhancement projects. In 2021, those projects include the "Pearson Well Being Center" and the "Open Dining" enhancements for Beebe Assisted Living. The "Pearson" project will bring exercise, recreation, and professional services for independent living residents to the lower level of the Pearson building. "Beebe Open Dining" will complete a campus-wide Food Services renovation, giving all Mayflower residents expanding dining options.

Hearing your charitable passions is the greatest joy of my work. I welcome a conversation this year, beginning with listening to what is most important to you. From there, I am confident we can discover a plan that will take you exactly where your heart is leading.

Valentine's Day Deserves a Dessert Treat

Sunday is Valentine's Day. How do you celebrate it and still be safe? At Grinnell's Mayflower Community, the answer was that you order a special trifle created for the event.

A trifle? What's that? According to Mayflower's Director of Foodservices, Scott Gruhn, a "Trifle (TRIfuhl), originally from England, is a dessert consisting of sponge cake or lady fingers doused with spirits, usually sherry. It is covered with jam and custard; topped with whipped cream; and garnished with candied or fresh



fruit, nuts, or grated chocolate. Trifles were composed in early times, when cooks in large English estates had surprise guests, and only bits and pieces with which to work."

How do we do it at Mayflower? We created a raspberry & chocolate mousse trifle desert. It is a Kahlua raspberry fluff and chocolate crème liqueur mousse with layers of sponge cake and topped with Chantilly crème. The ingredients in this layered dessert are 1)chocolate sponge; 2)chocolate Bailey's mousse; 3)vanilla sponge; 4)cream cheese, whip cream, yogurt, coffee, Kahlua, raspberry fluff; 5)caramel nest; 6)Chantilly cream; 7)mixed berries; 8)mint leaf; and 9)raspberry coulis.

To complement the dessert, other baked items were available in the Buckley Dining Room for resident selection.

The partying just never stops at Mayflower!

The Mayflower Community Foodservice staff is in the process of reviewing menu cycles. We would appreciate your thoughts about items you would like to see on our Buckley Dining Room





Presentation # 1: Women Airforce Service Pilots

Docent Leslie Czechowski will talk about the WASP, the program created for female pilots in the USAAF Air Transport Command in 1942. She will tell about the further growth of the program and experiences of a few of the pilots as they began to fly all of the USAAF fighter planes and even some of the bombers during the time they served. As one said afterward: "We didn't win the war. But we released the men so they could."

The tour consists of a 45-minute presentation, with a 15-minute question and answer period.

Docent Leslie Czechowski has a B.A. in Drama Theory, a M.S. in Library Science, and a M.S. in Liberal Studies (concentration in 19th century American history and literature). She has worked in a variety of library and archives positions at Grinnell College, The University of Minnesota, and The University of Pittsburgh. In addition, she taught graduate courses at The College of St. Catherine and The University of Pittsburgh. She has also authored many professional publications and presented on library and archival services. Leslie served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Moldova in 2012. She currently volunteers at the Kent Library teaching Microsoft Office software, volunteers at the Museum's archives, and joined the docent program at the Museum in 2016.

Leslie is a former resident of Grinnell, living here for about 25 years. Her parents lived in The Mayflower Community.

Book Review: The Vanishing Half by Brit Bennett

The Vanishing Half by Brit Bennett may be one of the best novels of 2020. I liked Bennett's first book, *The Mothers*, which we also have in the Mayflower Library, but *The Vanishing Half* blew me away.


This is the story of twin sisters, very light-skinned Blacks, who are raised in a Black town in Louisiana and witness their father being lynched in the 1940's. As young women they run away from home together but then make very different choices. One of the twins finds it expedient to pass as White and creates a complete life for herself as part of the White culture, a decision which requires her to break completely with her sister and her past. The other twin continues on her own path experiencing life as a Black woman in the second half of the twentieth century. Bennett explores many issues of race, gender and identity as the story of these two women, their mother, and their daughters unwinds from multiple points of view.

If you have read Isabel Wilkerson's book *Caste*, I predict you will find that each book illuminates the other and that you will have much to ponder.
