### Mayflower Residents Plant "Cousins" of Mayflower Ship Beans

With the support of Mayflower's Gardens and Grounds staff and Grinnell College's Farmhouse students, a group of Mayflower

residents is developing a garden of "Mayflower Beans." Located immediately south of the Watertower Square apartments, this two-row, 42-foot patch will leaf out as an attractive hedge.

The striking gray and red beans are of the same variety that were brought to American by the Pilgrims aboard the Mayflower ship in 1620. The Mayflower Community planting is surrounded by a 24" rabbit fence. The beans will grow on bamboo trellises.

On Wednesday, May 5<sup>th</sup>, The Rev. Eric Schubert, Senior Pastor of the Grinnell United Methodist Church, blessed the beans, observing, "We will give these beans all the help we can. Of course, being planted in the rich Iowa soil is a great headstart."

With the support of volunteer donations and labor, the plan is to harvest at least 20 pounds of the beans for serving at The Mayflower Community's 2021 Thanksgiving meal

The services and activities of The Mayflower Community are performed under the umbrella of two not-for-profit corporations, Mayflower Homes, Inc. (MHI) and the Mayflower Homes Foundation (the Foundation). Your tax-deductible charitable contributions are important to both entities, though

each uses your gifts differently to support resident care and services.

MHI is the "operating entity." This company owns the Mayflower campus property, employs the staff, and conducts the day-to-day activities. Your gifts to MHI are spent as they are received to provide care for residents with financial needs, provide staff with advanced education and training, start or expand a service for residents, or beautify campus buildings and grounds.

The unique and visionary role of the Foundation is the primary focus of this message. It was established in 1984 to sustain and grow The Mayflower Community.

Your gifts to the Foundation are accumulated and invested, with a portion of the annual investment income spent on Mayflower's charitable priorities. Providing healthcare for residents who have exhausted personal resources is priority number one.

The Foundation's "Human Needs Endowment Fund" has helped Mayflower sustain its intention that no resident is asked to leave for lack of personal funds. With a current balance nearing \$2.5 million, annual distributions from this fund provide approximately 30% of the yearly total necessary to support residents in need. The Foundation's visionary goal is that this fund one day provides the full amount necessary for this critical charitable mission.

The "Mission and Vision Fund" is a second Foundation reserve that holds gifts made without donor restriction. This fund helps Mayflower respond to emerging opportunities to serve residents. In the past, the fund has loaned dollars to MHI for construction of the current Health Center and Watertower Square buildings. Most recently, the fund loaned MHI dollars for critical infrastructure improvements in its central campus buildings.

Two additional funds support important MHI mission elements. The "Mayflower Employee Education Fund" makes annual distributions, which provide various professional education and training opportunities for grateful Mayflower staff. Distributions from the "Montgomery Church Leaders Fund" provide entrance fee support for retired clergy and full-time church employees consistent with the intentions of MHI's founders. Every dollar the Foundation contributes to MHI frees another dollar for the development of new and innovative resident services.

Please consider the Mayflower Foundation for a "legacy" gift in your current or future plans. Your focus might be specific, such as the "Human Needs Endowment Fund," or you might allow the Foundation to use your gift for the most urgent need at the time. Either way, you will touch lives across many generations.

#### **Book Review:** The Wreath

The three volumes of Sigrid Undset's *KRISTIN LAVRANSDATTER* in the Mayflower library come from Mary Lou Clotfelter' collection, which is a recommendation in itself.

The first book, *THE WREATH*, is set in Norway in the 14<sup>th</sup> century, and Undset transports readers to this cold and beautiful land. There, we meet young, lovely, passionate Kristin, her loving father, Lavrans, and her disconsolate mother, who has lost her three young sons. The two most powerful influences in Norway during this period were the Catholic church and the family. When Kristin falls in love with a handsome man of ill repute, she rebels against both these forces. Undset skillfully balances the tension between her characters and the magnificence of Norway's scenery.

When you finish *THE WREATH*, you will want to read books two and three of the trilogy, *THE WIFE* and *THE CROSS*.

# **Book Review:** Hilary Mantel Trilogy

Last year, Hilary Mantel published the third volume of her much-praised trilogy about Tudor England. *The Mirror and the Light,* like its predecessors, *Wolf Hall* and *Bring Up the Bodies,* is a hefty historical novel that shows off Mantel's prodigious research work and story-telling prowess. Both of the first two novels won the Booker Prize, and you may recall having seen the *PBS Masterpiece* series, *Wolf Hall,* based on the books. The Mayflower library has just acquired all three volumes of the trilogy.

These three novels trace the life and eventual death of Thomas Cromwell, the all-purpose fixer (think Michael Cohen) for Henry VIII. As Henry marries and discards wives in his desperate struggle to get himself a male heir, readers get to look over Cromwell's shoulder and occasionally into

his mind, watching the devious machinations of the Tudor court play out in real time. The cast of characters is enormous, so you may need to flip back to the character lists and genealogy charts at the beginning of the books to keep track of who is who, but for lovers of historical fiction this total immersion in the lives and deaths of the royals in Merry Old England is not to be missed.
