

Drake Community Library Historical Event

Mayflower resident, Barbara Lease, is working with the Drake Community Library on behalf of the Historical Museum on a book talk event to be held on **Wednesday**, **August** 4th from **10:00 to 11:30am** at the **Library**. Barbara shares the following information.

Ames artist and ISU economics professor, Patti and Kevin Kimle, have written a book of historical fiction, "The Only Free Road," that

takes place in Kansas and Iowa during the years preceding the Civil War. Several slaves are escaping on the Underground Railroad with the help of some abolitionists, one of whom is a young man from Grinnell who works for J. B. Grinnell. As this man becomes involved in escape on the Underground Railroad, J.B. and his wife Julia become briefly recurring characters in the story.

Patti and Kevin visited Grinnell several times to research the book, speaking with Barb and the late Karen Groves, Grinnell Historical Museum Board members.

The Kimles are on a book tour of some of the towns and cities about which they wrote. We are pleased to be able to host them in Grinnell.

The program will begin with a talk about J. B. Grinnell by Jon Andelson, PhD, Professor of Anthropology at Grinnell College. It is

titled, "Almost Too Good for Us: What Drove J. B. Grinnell?"

Following Jon's talk, Patti and Kevin will present their one-act, costumed play, entitled "Missives of the Civil War." Its characters, both fictional and real, share letters depicting the uncertainty and turmoil of those years leading up to the Civil War.

A question and answer session will follow the play. Refreshments provided by The Mayflower Community Foodservices department will wrap up the event.

Due to pandemic (Delta variant) seating restrictions, attendance will be limited and reservations are necessary. Although it will not be possible to live-stream the event, the Library hopes to be doing that in the future. To register for "J. B. UnLOCKIN the Power of Philanthropy Relief!

Fresh-squeezed lemonade seemed the perfect relief on a recent weekend afternoon. "Not a big deal!" you rightly say. However, I had never made lemonade from scratch and was too stubborn to "google" a recipe. Plus, a few family members were

tapping their toes in anticipation, ratcheting up the pressure.

I will not admit how long it took nor describe the mess I made. You would laugh at both. However, several tall glasses of lemonade, sweetened to each individual's taste, were delivered in time to quench the afternoon heat.

This lemonade adventure and the word "relief" come to mind when I think about a rare opportunity in the gift planning world. Made available only until the end of this calendar year, this process has been made possible by the 2020 "Cares Act," and an extension of a key provision through 2021.

Here is a recipe to determine whether relief might be headed your way:

- You have more funds in retirement plans (IRA, 401(k), 403(b)) than you will need for future living expenses.
- You prefer to avoid the taxes that must be paid by you or your heirs to access and use these retirement plan funds.
- You have current and future charitable ambitions for Mayflower and other organizations.

If you answered "YES" to each of these questions, the steps to complete before December 31st are as follows.

- Share your thinking with a professional advisor(s). I can help you start that conversation, but ultimately your advisor(s) and you should "check" a few simple boxes before proceeding.
- If you are 70 ½ or older and have an IRA account(s), first consider a "qualified charitable distribution" from your IRA directly to one or more charities. This is not the "rare opportunity" I'm suggesting, but rather the same technique that has been available for a number of years.
- Here, begins the "rare opportunity." Using a deposit into your checking account, withdraw funds from one or more retirement

- accounts that align with your charitable ambitions. These withdrawals are taxable and must be counted as income on your 2021 returns.
- Then make "cash" contributions (write checks) to Mayflower and other favorite organizations in amounts equaling these taxable withdrawals. These "cash" contributions are fully tax deductible for the rest of this year only, and will offset the extra income you are reporting.

Like making lemonade, this "opportunity" is not difficult or costly. However, because these gifts will likely be larger than average, the advice of your professional planners is a must. Please let me help you start this conversation or any other that involves accomplishing your charitable ambitions. I'll bring the lemonade!
