Vaccinations Get a Boost at Mayflower

On Friday, October 15th, 131 independent living residents in Grinnell's The Mayflower Community received Pfizer COVID-19 booster shots. The administration of the clinic was performed by Poweshiek County Public Health (PCPH) under the

direction of Director of Shawna Calloway, BSN, RN.

In February 2021, PCPH administered two rounds of the initial Pfizer shots to 198 residents. This clinic followed up with the recently-approved booster for those residents who had not already gotten a booster elsewhere.

Mayflower Health Center and Beebe Assisted Living residents and employees will received their Pfizer booster shots at a clinic on the Mayflower campus scheduled for October 28th with Hy-Vee Pharmacy.

Guidance Available for Medicare Choices

Local SHIIP-SMP counselor and Mayflower resident, Kathy Szary is sharing information with you about the Medicare open enrollment period.

The Senior Health Insurance Information Program—Senior Medicare Patrol (SHIIP-

SMP), a function of the State of Iowa Insurance Department trains counselors to provide Iowa senior citizens free of charge, current information about Medicare and Medicare Advantage drug coverage plans. Kathy has been providing this service to Grinnell-area residents for the last five years.

Between October 15th and December 7th, the "open enrollment period," Medicare recipients may choose their drug coverage plan for the coming year. Referred to as "Part D" of the original Medicare plan or Medicare Advantage, various options have differing coverage, premiums, co-payments, and deductibles.

The SHIIP-SMP counselors assist beneficiaries in determining which plan is best for them. Kathy says, "The program has a great track record for saving Iowans money and helping them with Medicare questions and problems. In 2019, the program saved Iowa Medicare beneficiaries more than \$36 million dollars."

Feel free to have a family member, caregiver, or friend accompany you. Bring your Medicare card and prescription bottles and wear a mask. Appointments are held on Mondays in the MRA Conference Room located in the Pearson building.

The Mayflower Residents Association's "Treasure Chest" display for the month of November will be a variety of craft items from Germany. The beautiful six-and-a-half foot tall curio cabinet that houses rotating collections is located in the Mayflower Community Pearson building lobby.





The November display will be a vintage collection of decorative items made in Germany. My parents, Forrest V. and Betty Schwengels, were stationed with the U.S. Air Force in Wiesbaden, Germany from 1946 to 1949. Things were pretty dismal for the German people after the war and the Schwengels frequented favorite craftspeople to help them make a living.

As part of the display, you will see hand-carved wood, porcelain, and German silver items. The best items they brought back with them were two additional children (a boy and girl) born

there who joined their older brother. I was 3 months old when I returned to the States.

Betty Schwengels lived in The Mayflower Community from 2001 until her passing in 2005, first in a Pearson apartment and later in Beebe Assisted Living and the Health Center.



American Fire by Monica Hesse. The arsons started on a cold November midnight and didn't stop for months. Vigilante groups sprang up, patrolling the rural Virginia coast with cameras and camouflage.

The culprit, and the path that led to these crimes, is a story of twenty-first-century America. *Washington Post* reporter Monica Hesse first drove down to the reeling county to cover a hearing for Charlie Smith, a struggling mechanic who upon his capture had promptly pleaded guilty to sixty-seven counts of arson.

During a year of investigating, Hesse uncovered the motives of Charlie and his accomplice, girlfriend Tonya Bundrick, a woman of strength and an inscrutable past. One hundred years ago, Accomack was the richest rural county in the nation.

Slowly it has been drained of its industry as well as its wealth and population. The result evokes the soul of rural America—a land half gutted before the fires even began.

Jane first meets Duncan in her pajamas. Despite the fact that he is known as the local lothario, Jane also succumbs to his charm.

A yellow leaf lands upon my shoe and I wonder how many yellow moons shine upon youhow many stars kiss your eyes and how many nights you miss our "goodbye."


