the pandemic. The Met, founded in 1883 at the corner of Broadway and 39th Street in New York and now located since 1966 in the Lincoln Center, produces an annual lineup of "cinema" HD shows that are carried by selected theatres.

Grinnell College/Mayflower Research Study Collaboration

"Kayley Rönnkvist (she/her) is a third-year student at Grinnell College originally from St. Peter, Minnesota, a town of about 10,000 people in south central Minnesota. She is majoring in French and Gender, Women's, and Sexuality

Studies.

Kayley began volunteering at Mayflower in 2019 when she helped coordinate the Adopt-A-Grandparent program between healthcare residents and Grinnell College students. She later assisted with other activities in Beebe Assisted Living and the Health Center. Kayley was part of the College computer science class that helped Mayflower residents develop the current online Mayflower residents directory. She is pictured above.

Kayley is leading a multi-year project studying "Equitable Aging Practices in Rural Central Iowa," alongside Dr. Karla Erickson, Professor of Sociology at Grinnell College. Kayley is examining the unmet needs of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and/or transgender older adults, and the policies and practices older adult service providers can implement to better support these needs. The project has been approved by the Grinnell College Institutional Review Board and is funded by an Andrew W. Mellon Humanities in Action Grant. This summer and fall, Kayley has engaged in an expansive review of existing gerontological research, met dozens of Iowa senior adult service providers, and connected with leaders in lesbian, gay, bisexual, and/or transgender aging activism at various organizations.

Working with Mayflower leadership to assess how Mayflower could establish more inclusive and equitable practices, Kayley has

developed a survey that will be administered shortly with residents. Results from the survey will be utilized to learn more about our community members and to make Mayflower a more welcoming place.

Author Marilyn Schuler Does Mayflower Book Signing

Marilyn Schuler and her husband, Rev. Pete Schuler, moved to a Mayflower Altemeier apartment in 2008. Pete was a retired Quaker minister, and Marilyn had been an elementary school teacher in the Lynnville-Sully School District. Five months later, Pete died of cancer.



According to Marilyn, she later responded to "...the Holy Spirit's still small voice and after much trial and error...," she authored the first of her "Animals of the Bible" picture books in 2011.

Previously, Marilyn had written three short Easter stories, read them to her Sunday school classes, and filed them away. But, now she was on a roll. "A Big Day for Jack," the story of an unbroken colt ridden by Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, was the first of her "Animal" books.

Now, a decade later, there are seven "Animal" picture books, for children, and three chapters about David's life for older readers, ages eight to 12. Marilyn's daughter Elizabeth, a retired lawyer, established Oakdale Publishing and is now handling her books.

APPLES NEVER FALL

A suspected murder? A missing body? The Delaneys, Stan and Joy, are killers on the tennis court, and off it they have palpable chemistry. They have just sold their tennis academy and are ready to begin retirement only to discover they are miserable. The four Delaney children – Amy, Logan, Troy and Brook – were all tennis stars in their own right but to their father's disappointment never had what it took to become champions.

Now they are all successful grownups and Joy is holding on to hope for a grandchild. One night a stranger names Suzanna knocks on their door. She tumbles in bleeding and says she had a fight with her boyfriend. Stan and Joy take her in and a night turns into days and then weeks. One day Joy goes missing and Savannah is not to be found. As always, the husband becomes the main suspect. While two of the children think their father is innocent, two are not sure. As they begin to reexamine their shared family history it seems all is not as they believed.

I enjoyed this book and was intrigued by the mystery of Joy's disappearance. However, I found the ending somewhat contrived and in many ways made no sense.

November 20th: *Sliding Doors* (1998) Funny and touching. One girl, two parallel lives. Gwyneth Paltrow plays London publicist Helen Quilley, effortlessly sliding between parallel story lines that show what happens if she does or does not catch a morning train back to her apartment. Deception, trust, friendship, comedy. All comes into focus as the two stories shift back and forth. PG-13. 99 minutes. English captions.

November 27th: *Staying On* (1981) This delightful drama, based on the award-winning novel by Paul Scott (*The Jewell in the Crown*) reunites Trevor Howard and Celia Johnson for the first time since *Brief Encounter*.
