Mayflower Announces Nursing Leadership Changes

Steve Langerud, Executive Director, and Kellie McGriff, BSN, NHA, Associate Director/Administrator, The Mayflower Community, Grinnell announce the following changes in Nursing leadership.

Lisa Leris, BSN, RN has been named Director

of Health Services. She will begin full-time duties in the position on January 1, 2022. Lisa has served as the Grinnell-Newburg Community Schools nurse for the last five years, responsible for over 750 public school students, and earning two "Above and Beyond" awards for excellence in care.

With a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree from Queens University of Charlotte, North Carolina, Lisa has over 20 years of nursing experience in Medical-Surgical, Obstetrics, Emergency Room, Intensive Care, Public Health, and Hospice.

While serving in public health, Lisa engaged in presenting immunization clinics and growing the high-risk maternal/child health program, home health care, certified lactation consulting, and school anti-tobacco and anti-drug programs.

Lisa previously served as the coordinator of Postels Community Health Park, where she received training in healing touch, aromatherapy, reflexology, and alternative pain therapy, as well as several other alternative medicine techniques. While in this role, Lisa helped found the Galaxy Youth Center.

Kellie McGriff says about Lisa, "She is a compassionate and seasoned

nurse leader with strategic connections in healthcare that will facilitate Mayflower's well-being model across campus."

Brittany Hinkle, BSN, RN, will become Mayflower's Interim Director of Assisted Living on November 23rd. She received her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Grand View University, Des Moines in 2010. Prior to returning home to Grinnell in 2012, she served in a Des Moines skilled nursing facility. Brittany then worked at Grinnell Regional Medical Center on the Medical Surgical floor and in the Surgery department for eight years.



Brittany began her employment with The Mayflower Community as a charge nurse in the Health Center in 2020. Currently, Brittany is pursuing a Master of Science in Nursing and an advanced degree as a Family Nurse Practitioner.

Steve Langerud is looking forward to Brittany's involvement in Mayflower assisted living, "Brittany is an exceptional nurse and demonstrates the leadership skills to move our assisted living program forward. Brittany is the right person to implement recent upgrades to our assisted living facility through our T.I.P. grant.

Therapy Providers at The Mayflower Community

Mayflower is partnering with Key Rehab to offer physical, occupational, and speechpathology therapy on the Mayflower campus. This includes locations in the Health Center, Beebe Assisted Living, and a suite located in the Pearson building for independent living residents.



Mayflower is now offering a variety of physical movement programs, in response to resident needs identified in a recent survey. Overseeing these new offerings, Jackie Hutchison MPT, CST-T, will serve as Mayflower's Director of Rehab and Wellness. Jackie holds a master's in Physical Therapy ("MPT") from Marquette University and certification in Craniosacral Therapy ("CST-T") from the Upledger Institute, Palm Beach Gardens FL.

Key Rehab will assign specific licensed and certified therapists to Mayflower. If it is necessary, they will be backed up by additional therapists stationed in Central Iowa.

Besides access at various sites on campus, residents may, in some cases, receive Key Rehab services in their own homes. The services provided will be based on individual patients' needs, as ordered by their physicians.

Key therapists are experienced in treating the following diagnoses and conditions: Stroke; orthopedic impairment, such as hip fracture, joint replacement, arthritis, shoulder or hand injuries; neurological disorders such as Parkinson's disease and Multiple Sclerosis; communication disorders; swallowing deficits; generalized weakness and the loss of abilities due to illness or injury.

If you feel that you might benefit from therapy services, consult with your physician, who can prescribe therapy services provided here at Mayflower. Medicare typically covers therapy services if they are medically necessary and ordered by a physician. Please let us know if you have any questions or contact your insurance provider for coverage questions.

Special Loan for Mayflower Open Dining

The Mayflower Community, Grinnell, Iowa has been awarded a \$300,000 USDA Rural Economic Development Grant (REDG) loan, designated by the T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative of Brooklyn, Iowa. T.I.P. Rural Electric

Cooperative applied to the USDA Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant program and was granted the \$300,000 to make a zero-interest loan to Mayflower Community. T.I.P. REC's board of directors added \$60,000 in matching funds required by USDA to fund the \$360,000 loan.

The loan request was written by Mayflower's Associate Director/Administrator, Kellie McGriff, BSN, RN, NHA, with support from Chief Financial Officer, Pam Vosburg, CPA. The proceeds will be used for the completion of the Beebe Assisted Living Open Dining project, which will provide a self-contained preparation and serving kitchen for the 20-apartment building. Residents will be able to dine at any time of the day, choosing items from a broad menu that will change daily. In addition, an outdoor patio will be added on the south side of the building, with access from the main dining room.

Beebe Assisted Living is a 17,000 square foot, two-story facility that will be renovated to meet enhanced regulatory requirements for assisted living and to improve safety and quality of life amenities. The loan will help Mayflower develop a full service, 340 square-foot kitchen; install a sprinkler system on the second floor; create a blown-fiberglass fire barrier between floors; add a 211 square-foot office; build a new 521 square-foot resident apartment; and develop two outdoor living, dining and entertainment spaces.

McGriff continues, "Mayflower is committed to providing dedicated and integrated spaces for health and well-being services on its campus, educational programs for residents and staff, training space for employees, and business space for healthcare entrepreneurs. Plans are in place to construct these elements of new well-being space: 598 square-foot Salon, 742 square-foot Therapy Clinic (Physical, Occupational, Speech, Cranio-sacral, Acupuncture), 381 square-foot Spa (Massage and Meditation), 1,000 square-foot Fitness Studio, and 1,000 square-foot Strength and Cardiovascular Equipment Room."

The Beebe Assisted Living Open Dining project work began in October 2020 and will be completed with the assistance of the REDG loan from T.I.P. Rural Electric Cooperative. The estimated cost of the Beebe patio and courtyard and the Beebe cooking and serving kitchen is \$584,000. Numerous donors have contributed to this project.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) **Rural Development** accepts applications for projects that promote economic development and job creation in rural areas.

Mayflower's Master Puzzler Does Anatomy

You might recall the name, "John Noer." He is the Mayflower Community resident who is an avid jigsaw puzzle assembler. John has completed many puzzles, including a 9,000-piece vibrant aquascape and the 40,000-piece, 10-frame Disney character collage.



Taking advantage of John's fondness for puzzling, his daughter Mary, a high school science teacher, presented John with the 4,175-piece Dr. Livingstone's full body anatomy jigsaw puzzle. She is thinking that she can use it eventually in her classroom.

John has now finished the puzzle, which is glued-together and will be covered with clear contact paper. It is currently stored under the bed in John's and wife Dorothy's Mayflower apartment until Mary can pick it up. They are not going to try to ship it!

MRA December 6th HYBRID Town Meeting

The MRA Council meeting on November 15th was successfully carried out hybrid-style, with some attending in person in Kiesel Theater and others participating by Zoom. We hope to host another successful MRA Town meeting on **December 6th at 2:00 pm**.

Although we will not all fit into **Kiesel** (capacity 53), for those who look forward to this opportunity for in-person social contact, we welcome your presence. For those who find **Zoom** particularly convenient, perhaps because you can come and go as you please, easily take a bathroom break when necessary, avoid congestion in parking walkers, or possibly hear better, we are glad that this option is available given the new AV capabilities in Kiesel.

All Mayflower residents are encouraged to attend in one form or the other. A Zoom link for this meeting will be sent closer to the meeting time, as well as annual reports by officers and committee chairs. The annual Town Meeting is when we elect officers for the coming year. It's also an opportunity to comment on and ask questions about activities of the current year. We also value the chance to be updated by administration senior staff on various Mayflower policies and projects underway.

The Executive Committee will be presenting a proposed amendment of the MRA Bylaws, which was approved by the Council at its November meeting. Currently, Article VIII Financial Organization, Section 2 reads as follows: "The Finance Committee shall prepare an annual budget to be presented to the Council at the spring Town Meeting. This budget will be presented and voted on at the spring Town Meeting."

The new proposed wording is as follows: "The Finance Committee shall prepare an annual budget to be presented to the Council at its spring meeting. This budget will be presented and voted on at the spring Town Meeting."

This amendment clarifies that the MRA budget process entails two steps. The Finance Committee first presents a proposed budget to the Council, and subject to amendment and approval by the Council, subsequently presents it to the spring Town Meeting.


