Well-Being at Mayflower

Food For Thought

Plant-based fat is an essential nutrient for brain health and repair. MIND (Mediterranean-Dash Intervention for Neurodegenerative Delay) recommends eating tree nuts at least five times weekly and using olive oil as the primary kitchen oil.



Tree nuts and olive oil are rich in essential fatty acids, antioxidants, and fat-soluble vitamins, all nutrients which have been shown to reduce inflammation and support optimal brain function. Studies have shown improvements in memory tests, executive function, and global cognition tests in persons who regularly consume nuts and olive oil.


Tree nuts include almonds, pecans, walnuts, hazelnuts, cashews, pistachios, Brazil nuts, macadamia nuts, and pine nuts. Did you notice that peanuts are missing? Peanuts are a legume and differ in fat composition, resulting in a lower benefit to brain health. As for extra-virgin olive oil, look for bottles of opaque or dark glass. Extra virgin oil is useful both raw (in dressings or dipping oils) and as a cooking fat.

Need ideas? Nuts and olive oil can be incorporated into any meal or snack. A breakfast parfait or oatmeal can be topped with mixed nuts. Or scramble eggs and veggies in olive oil. Choose an olive-oil based dressing for your salad like this **basic vinaigrette**.

Spread hummus or pesto on sandwiches or wraps. Toss pasta in olive oil before serving. Or satisfy a snack craving with a handful of tree nuts. The possibilities are endless. Enjoy!

Book Review

The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek Kim Michele Richardson

Kim Michele Richardson's historical novel about packhorse librarians

in Kentucky, *The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek*, appeared just five months before Jojo Moyes' better-known novel on the same topic, *The Giver of Stars*. In Richardson's book, the main character comes from a distinctly hardscrabble background and is also one of the last of the blue-skinned people of Kentucky. The book focuses equally on the satisfactions and dangers of being a packhorse librarian and the difficulties of being seen as cursed and "colored" in the thirties in Appalachia. Having read both books now, I am puzzled by Richardson's claims of plagiarism on Jojo Moyes's part. The books seem to have quite a different focus and perspective. Perhaps I will now have to reread *The Giver of Stars*. As of the end of May, both books will be available in Pearson Library.

If you enjoy *The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek* and would like us to get the sequel, please let someone on the library committee know. The large print edition of *The Book Woman's Daughter* is scheduled to be released soon.

Fair Warning Michael Connelly

This is the third thriller featuring L.A. reporter, Jack McEvoy, who is now working for Fair Warning, an on-line news site that focuses on consumer fraud. Jack becomes a"person of interest" in the murder of a woman with whom he had a one-night stand a year ago. The woman was killed in a very unusual manner which concerns Jack. He begins investigating and finds that several others have been killed in the same unusual way.

When he finds an additional connection between the victims, he theorizes that one person is likely responsible for all the deaths and the hunt begins. This was not one of my favorite Connelly books but still keeps you guessing until the end.
