Steve Langerud, Executive Director of Grinnell's Mayflower Community, announces that Ronald Benner of North Liberty, Iowa has been named Mayflower's Director of Facilities Management to

succeed Jack Morrison. Morrison will retire September 2nd after 38 years of service to Mayflower.

Benner has served as Facilities Maintenance Manager for Nordstrom Cedar Rapids, a 500,000 square-foot fulfillment and contact center located on Interstate 380 south of Cedar Rapids. At Nordstrom, Benner oversaw a 42-member team. His previous experience includes facility management, property management, and engineering with Cedar Rapids area manufacturers and Marriott Hotels and Resorts, as well as the University of Iowa Foundation's 120,000 square foot building.

Beginning August 2nd, Benner will be working at Mayflower in transition with Morrison.

Well-Being at Mayflower

MIND Diet: Food for Thought Recommended Foods: Grains and Beans

Carbohydrates are the primary source of glucose, the preferred fuel for the brain and body. Maintaining stable blood glucose levels is an essential, ongoing physical function that

involves multiple hormones and organ systems. Researchers are continuing to discover connections between uncontrolled blood sugar (diabetes), cognitive decline, and the development of Alzheimer's disease. Chronic elevated blood sugar appears to damage delicate nerve tissues, increasing disease risk.

Smart carbohydrate choices are a foundational component of blood sugar stability and brain health. The MIND diet (Mediterranean-Dash Intervention for Neurodegenerative Delay) encourages carbohydrates in the form of whole grains and beans. Choose whole grain foods at least three times daily. Oats, brown rice, farro, barley, bulgur, whole grain pasta, quinoa, wild rice, breads made with whole wheat flour, and popcorn are among the options.

All varieties of beans are encouraged at least four times weekly. These varieties include Chickpeas (including hummus), lentils, black beans, cannellini beans, pinto beans, kidney beans, fava beans, lima beans, navy beans, black-eyed peas, and red beans.

In general, whole grains and beans have a mild and slightly nutty

flavor. This mildness plays well in almost any recipe, making for endless possibilities in the kitchen. Three is no need to choose between flavor and enjoyment versus brain health and blood sugar control. Whole grains and beans offer the best of both worlds.

Opportunity for Mayflower Residents to Participate in Russian Food Course

"Comrades in the Kitchen: Russian and Soviet Food Culture."

Everyone has a food story; what's yours?

I invite you to join me and my students this fall in an exciting opportunity to collaborate in my course "Comrades in the Kitchen: Russian and Soviet Food Culture." Participants will team with groups of Grinnell College students in sharing each other's food stories and exploring together the meaning of food in Russia and the countries of the former Soviet Union, with special focus on Ukraine, as we read and discuss Anya Von Bremzen's Mastering the Art of Soviet Cooking: A Memoir of Longing and Desire, along with a number of other texts. My course involves hands-on learning, as students learn to cook in our new Global Kitchen—and as they cook to learn. We'll also break bread together, when possible.

Special note: Insofar as any discussion of food must also address its lack, we will consider the question of hunger and starvation, which have profoundly affected the region; the current global



food crisis brought on by Russia's invasion of Ukraine is sadly not an exception. Indeed, everyone does have a food story—but not everyone's food story is a good one. Such human suffering demands a response, and in this light, we will seek ways to take action and feed others in our community.

The course will meet regularly on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 2-3:50 p.m.; participants won't attend every session and will occasionally meet with students outside of class. More information will follow later in the summer; for now, I'm surveying interest in such an opportunity. I am seeking up to ten participants.

Book Reviews

The Woman They Could Not Silence by Kate Moore

This is the true story of Elizabeth Packard, housewife and mother of six. Her husband of twenty-one years, Theophilus, is increasingly threatened by Elizabeth's intelligence and independence and her insistence on voicing her thoughts. He plots and succeeds in 1860 in having her committed to an insane asylum. The horrific conditions inside the Illinois State Hospital are overseen by Dr. Andrew McFarland who will be even more of a threat to Elizabeth than her husband.

She is not the only rational woman on her ward who tell the same story: They have been committed to keep them inline and conveniently labeled "crazy." She discovers that the merit of losing everything is that then, there is nothing to lose. Elizabeth's refusal to be silenced and her quest for justice not only challenged the medical science of the day but led to a giant leap forward in human rights. A vivid look at the life and times of a little-known pioneer of women's rights, Eliza-beth's story is in many ways relevant to today's world. -Member of MRA Library Committee Member

State of Terror by Hillary Rodham Clinton and Louis Penny

This is a political-mystery novel by mystery author, Louise Penny, and former Secretary of State, Hillary Clinton, both bringing their expertise to write a high-stakes thriller of international intrigue. A series of terrorist attacks throws the global order into disarray and the newly appointed Secretary of State, Ellen Adams, is tasked with assembling a team to figure out what has happened, who are the terrorists and how can they be stopped.

This becomes more difficult as the previous Administration has left the American government dangerously out of touch with global concerns. The authors keep us guessing until the end with lots of twists and turns.
