Food, Mood, and Mental Well-Being

With the New Year, Mayflower's Well-Being feature will begin a new series discussing the intricate interplay between food, mood, mental health, and wellbeing. The food/mood connection is complex. Understanding of this complexity is ever-evolving as researchers are progressively uncovering pieces of the puzzle.



At the intersection of food choices and mental health is the gastrointestinal (GI) tract, also known as "gut." Responsible for digestion and absorption of foods, the gut serves as the gate through which food's energy and nutrients are allowed into the body.

Nicknamed the "second brain," the gut is also responsible for producing and utilizing neurotransmitters. Neurotransmitters (NTs) are chemicals that communicate information throughout the brain and body. NTs directly affect mood, sleep, concentration, weight, cravings, and addictions. NTs that are outside of normal balance contribute to depression, pain, anxiety, and insomnia, among other mental health concerns. Together, the brain and gut produce and utilize NTs, with the ultimate goal of maintaining physical and mental equilibrium and health.

The foods we eat directly affect the gut's ability to produce and utilize NTs. Thus, dietary choices have a significant impact on mental health and wellbeing. Certain foods promote optimal functioning, while others can impair digestion or increase inflammation. Throughout 2023, we will discuss foods recommended to support gut health when addressing specific mental health

diagnoses. We will also strategize the use of "gut friendly" foods and supplements to support general gut health for all individuals. Come along on the journey to find optimal foods to support a stable, healthy mood!

Treasure Chest

Toy Sewing Machine Collection Vicki Gruhn

The manufacturer of toy sewing machines started in the 1880's, primarily by German machine, tool, and watch companies. They were sold not only as toys, but as a method to teach young children how to sew.

The popularity of the machines continued through WWII, when several of the manufacturers were forced to change their production to items needed for war efforts.

As the development of plastic made its way into the toy production, toy machines made of metals faded from the market in the 1950's.

The Treasure Chest display is a sample of the 30+ machines within the collection.

Back in the old days....Prior to the pandemic, The Mayflower Community maintained a much-used "Sports Room" in the north end of the Health Center lower level. Miniature golf, walking track, billiards, shuffleboard, exercise space....AND table tennis.



That space is again open for use by Mayflower residents. And, to punctuate the fun, there is again organized table tennis playing. Fridays. 1:00pm. All skill levels. Whoever shows up just rotates in between points.

Resident Marilyn Schuler has issued an invitation to residents to "Come join us! You haven't played for 30 years? It's like riding a bicycle, you never forget!" You probably just need a little practice."

Marilyn reports that she researched the Sports Room history in the Mayflower chronicle, *A Journey in Faith*, and found the story of the resident-built miniature golf course. But, she found no reference to the table tennis set-up. That's because it began after the publishing of the first 50 years of Mayflower history.

Irene Engelmann brought with her two tables, paddles, and balls when she moved to Mayflower in the summer of 2007. Shortly thereafter, the space was dedicated as the Vic and Irene Engelmann Table Tennis Center. In the accompanying photo published in a 2016 Edition of *The Log*, Marilyn partners with Judy Hunter.

Irene's husband, Rev. Victor Engelmann, was a retired United Church of Christ pastor. In their joint ministries, the Engelmanns encouraged the playing of table tennis, especially among youth. In the process, they themselves entered many mixed doubles tournaments around the country with significant success. Vic died in 2004 and Irene in 2017.

After table tennis caught on and Irene's original tables became worn, players made a joint donation to Mayflower to purchase two new, competition tables. The fun continued. One year, three different Mayflower residents won medals in their age classes at the All-Iowa

games. Two of those champions were Warren Reinecke and Jack Gustafson. Do you recall who was the third?

The Sports Room space is well-lit, with good ventilation and screens around the tables to reduce the amount of ball chasing! Marilyn would like to see you on a Friday afternoon. For further information, give her a call (641-891-7760).

The Winners by Fredrik Backman

A new novel from Author Fredrik Backman, *The Winners* returns to the close-knit community of Beartown for a story of first loves, second chances and last goodbyes. It starts with a storm, a death and two funerals on the same day. A late summer storm reignites the old rivalry between Beartown and the neighboring town of Hed, a rivalry that has always been fought through their ice hockey teams. Simmering tensions between the two towns turn into acts of intimidation and then violence.

The Winners beautifully captures all the complexities of daily life and explores questions of friendship, loyalty, loss and identity. This novel asks us to reconsider what it means to win, what it means to lose and

what it means to forgive.

Circe by Madeline Miller (Large Print)

Miller has given new life to the story of Circes, the daughter of the sun god Helios, the aunt of Media, the aunt of the Minotaur and the cousin of Prometheus. We get to experience Circe grow from a weak young girl to a brave and powerful woman.

Her journey is long and filled with forces trying to hold her back but she is persistent and finds her way. Miller's writing style is smooth and beautiful and engages the reader, keeping readers hooked and eager for the next chapter. She has built a bridge between the Greek mythological character, Circe, and modern day women.

January 21st: *Hello Dolly* (1969). In turn-of-the century Yonkers,



New York, an ambitious young widow with a penchant for matchmaking (Barbra Streisand) has an idea for the perfect match: tight-fisted, local merchant Horace Vandergelder (Walter Matthau), and herself! As she tries to win his heart, we're treated to one of the most musically entertaining, hilariously underhanded plots in film history. G. English subtitles. 2 hrs/28 min.

January 25th: Same Time Next Year (1978). Oscar-winner Ellen Burstyn and the ever-popular Alan Alda star in this sweet romantic comedy tracing the unique 26-year relationship between two people who happen to be married to other people. When Doris (Burstyn), a young housewife from Oakland, and George (Alda), an accountant from New Jersey, meet by chance at a rural California inn, they embark on an affair that brings them together on the same weekend, in the same place, for the next 26 years. As time passes, events in their personal lives impact their special once-a-year romance in this heartwarming comedy. PG. English subtitles. 2 hours.

February 4th: Bonhoeffer, Agent of Grace (2003). What is a moral person to do in a time of savage immorality? That question tormented Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German clergyman of great distinction who actively opposed Hitler and the Nazis. His convictions cost him his life. This film sheds light on the little-known efforts of the German resistance. It brings to the audience the heroic rebellion of this highly regarded Lutheran minister who could have kept his peace and saved his life. Instead he paid the ultimate price for his beliefs. Not rated. English subtitles. 90 minutes.

February 11th: Roman Holiday (1953). The film was nominated for 10 Academy Awards, and Audrey Hepburn captured an Oscar for her portrayal of a modern-day princess rebelling against her royal obligations to explore Rome on her own. She meets Gregory Peck, an American newspaperman who, seeking an exclusive story pretends ignorance of her true identity. G. English subtitles. 118 minutes.

February 18th: Some Like It Hot (1959). When Chicago musicians Joe (Tony Curtis) and Jerry (Jack Lemmon) accidentally witness a gangland shooting, they quickly board a southbound train to Florida, disguised as Josephine and Daphne, the two newest—and homeliest-members of an all-girl jazz band. Their cover is perfect until a lovelorn singer (Marilyn Monroe) falls for "Josephine". An ancient playboy falls for "Daphne", and a mob boss (George Raft) refuses to fall for their hoax! Black and white. Not rated. No subtitles. 122

minutes.

February 25th: The White Countess (2005). Takes place in the glamorous, corrupt, and boomtown atmosphere of the 1930's Shanghai that is soon to be swept away by advancing Japanese armies and civil war. At its center are the blind American diplomat, Todd Jackson, played by Ralph Fiennes and Sofia Belinskaya, played by Natasha Richardson, a refuge Russian aristocrat making a living in a taxi dancehall and as an occasional prostitute. In the spectacular mass exodus from the city, Sofia is abandoned by her in-laws played by the Redgrave sisters. In the end, mother and daughter are reunited, as Sofia and Jackson, realizing their growing love for each other, escape to the safety of Macao. PG-13. English subtitles. 132 minutes.
