UnLOCKIN the Power of Philanthropy: Changes Ahead for Popular "Endow Iowa" Tax Credits

Part of Mayflower's "Human Needs Endowment Fund" is held on our behalf by the Greater Poweshiek Community Foundation (GPCF). Donors to this endowment fund have qualified for a federal income

tax deduction AND a 25% state of Iowa income tax credit. These "Endow Iowa" Tax Credits became so popular among Iowa taxpayers that waitlists for future credits developed years ago as current-year credits authorized by the Iowa Legislature were consumed.

Last month, the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) announced changes to this program, including: 1) The waitlist process, administered by IEDA, will be discontinued effective July 1, 2023. All donors currently on waitlists will not be affected by this change. Donors who make gifts and apply for Endow Iowa tax credits prior to June 30, 2023 will continue to be placed on the 2024 waitlist. If you desire to make an Endow Iowa gift before the system closes, you are encouraged to do so by June 15, 2023. 2) GPCF (and other community foundations) will not be able to submit Endow Iowa applications on behalf of donors from July 1, 2023 until IEDA re-opens the application process. No "re-open" date has been provided at this time.

Complimentary bills are currently before the Iowa House of Representatives and the Iowa Senate that provide additional appropriations to meet the current and future demand.

We thank all of you who have supported Mayflower's fund at GPCF. Its current balance is approximately \$570,000 from which GPCF will be distributing \$20,000 to Mayflower this year to help care for residents who have exhausted their personal resources.

Want to Counter the Climate Crisis? Compost!

Yes, you can counter the climate crisis simply by composting your table scraps! Your MRA Green Team has been



talking with Steve Langerud and Scott Gruhn and with Bel Kugel, Build a Better Grinnell Coordinator, about how to make composting easier for Mayflower residents.

What is composting? It's the decomposition of food scraps, leaves, and yard waste by fungi, bacteria, and other microorganisms into a crumbly, earth-smelling soil amendment called COMPOST.

How does residential composting combat the climate crisis? 1) It drastically reduces emission of methane, a potent greenhouse gas. Putting food scraps in landfills produces 20 times more methane than composting does. And when compost is used on soil, its net emissions are negative, because it sequesters carbon.

2) It increases nutrients in the soil and reduces the use of chemical fertilizers.

3) It increases the water-holding capacity of the soil.

Steve and Scott are in the initial stages of considering a food waste reduction system for scraps from the Buckley Dining Room. The system reduces the volume of the waste by removing excess water and handles up to 700 pounds of waste per hour, so it could also accept food waste from residents' kitchens.

The Green Team is looking at small, lightweight, covered canisters for countertops, which would be emptied into



covered buckets in utility rooms and collected along with general trash. The composting material would be stored well away from residences and, when finished, could be used in Mayflower gardens and other places.

The Last Thing He Told Me by Laura Dave

Before Owen Michaels disappears, he manages to smuggle a note to his beloved wife of one year: "Protect her." Despite her confusion and fear, Hannah Hall knows exactly to whom the note refers: Owens' sixteen-year-old daughter Bailey. Bailey, who as a child, lost her mother tragically.

Bailey wants absolutely nothing to do with her new stepmother. As Hannah's increasingly desperate calls to Owen go unanswered, the FBI arrests Owen's boss and a U.S. marshal and federal agents arrive at her Sausalito home unannounced. Hannah quickly realizes her husband isn't who he said he was and that Bailey just may hold the key to figuring out Owen's true identity and why he disappeared.

Hannah and Bailey set out to discover the truth and they soon realize they are also building a new future. Fast paced, dizzy plot twist, and family drama, *The Last thing He told Me* is a riveting mystery and will shock you with its final turn.

Spare by Prince Harry

For the first time, Prince Harry tells his own story, chronicling his journey with raw, unflinching honesty. A landmark publication, *Spare* is full of insight, revelation, self-examination, and hard-won wisdom about the eternal power of love over grief.

Before losing his mother, twelve-year-old Prince Harry was known as the carefree one, the happy-go-lucky Spare to the more serious Heir. Grief changed everything. He struggled at school, struggled with anger, with loneliness and, because he blamed the press for his mother's death, he struggled to accept life in the spotlight.

Sibling rivalry, fatherly neglect, and the crushing weight of public opinion haunt this anguished, searching, and occasionally vindictive memoir from Prince Harry. Framing the narrative as an attempt to explain why he and his wife, Meghan Markle, fled the U.K. "in fear for our sanity and physical safety" in 2020, Harry begins with Princess Diana's death in 1997, recounting how he and his brother William were made to walk behind their mother's coffin "to garner sympathy."

For years afterward, Harry harbored a belief that Diana had disappeared to escape the paparazzi—an illusion that enabled him "to postpone the bulk of my grief." Made to feel like a "nullity" by his family, he found solace and companionship on safari trips to Africa and boozy nights with friends, but the tabloids turned "basic teenage stuff" into allegations of drug addiction and his father chose "to play ball" rather than fight back.

Time and time again, the twin pressures of the royal family and the British media scuttled Harry's search for meaning and purpose, leaving him beset by panic attacks and self-doubt, until he met Meghan—and then those same specters turned on her. The mix of dirty laundry and earnest soul-baring sometimes jars, but Harry's frustrations are deeply felt and authentically conveyed, as is the joy he takes in nature and in his friendships. This royal family tell-all delivers.

April 15th: *Alexander's Ragtime Band* (1938). Tyrone Power stars in this extravaganza of music, story, and romance set in the early 1900's. Irving Berlin's masterpiece chronicles the highs and lows of the San Francisco aristocrat who changes his name to Alexander and leads a band with a whole new sound: swing! Grant meets with musical successes and failures as he conducts an on-again, off-again love affair with lead singer, Stella Kirby (Alice Faye). Also featured are Don Ameche, Jack Haley, and Ethel Merman. Black & White. Not Rated. 106 minutes. English subtitles.

April 22nd: *Destination Tokyo* (1944). Cary Grant captains a torpedo-laden U.S. submarine as it makes its way from San Francisco to the Aleutians and into the enemy's front yard. Under the direction of Delmer Daves, John Garfield leads a stellar array of costars as

boys-next-door-gone-to-war. One of the most rousing, action-filled WWII films ever produced. Black & White. Not Rated. 135 minutes. English subtitles.

April 29th: *Rebecca* (1940). After a whirlwind romance, mysterious widower Maxim de Winter (Laurence Olivier) brings his shy, young bride (Joan Fontaine) home to his imposing estate, Manderley. But she finds her married life dominated by the sinister influence of Maxim's late wife, the brilliant, beautiful Rebecca, who seems to still rule Manderley and Maxim from beyond the grave.
