Mayflower Gets High Ratings

As of the completion of the Mayflower Health Center annual comprehensive inspection

("recertification") by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals, Mayflower has been awarded a "**Zero Deficiency**" rating while also carrying the national **Five Star** designation!

State surveyors were on premise Monday, May 8th through Thursday, May 11th. At their departure, the survey team thanked Mayflower's department leadership team for the kindness shown to them by residents and staff during the survey while awarding the outstanding rating.

In addition, the staff are celebrating because, with the ending of the national COVID-19 emergency on May 11th, Mayflower has acted to no longer require face masks, except in extenuating circumstances.

The state recertification survey documents non-compliance with federal and state certification requirements in nursing and rehab facilities. The inspection is a requirement for continued funding from Medicare and Medicaid. The resulting "statement of deficiencies" (none for Mayflower!) serves as a tool for the facility to use to correct issues that do not meet minimal governmental standards of care.

Mayflower resident and retired medical doctor, Becky Neal, commented on the news about the Mayflower ratings, "Congratulations on the zero deficiency and five-star rating award for the health center! That's huge. Having been through several rounds of hospital certifications I'm well aware of the effort that goes into preparation for inspections not to mention sustaining excellence over time. This designation is due to great leadership and a dedicated staff."

The Five-Star Quality Rating System is a tool to help consumers select and compare skilled nursing care centers. Created by the U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) in 2008, the rating system uses information from Health Care Surveys, Quality Measures, and Staffing. Facilities are rated from one to five, with Five being the highest.

Theresa Pagliai, the President of the Mayflower Community Board of Trustees said, "The collective efforts, attention to detail, and hard work are always appreciated, especially with the challenging work environment during COVID. These two State distinctions affirm the hard work of these teams at Mayflower. The residents of Mayflower directly benefit from the sacrifices, and we are all very grateful for the service of the staff."

Mayflower appreciates all that our Nursing, Facilities, Foodservices, Community Life, Housekeeping and Laundry, and Human Resources leadership and staff do to meet safety and care regulatory expectations and to contribute to the Five-Star rating.

Health Center "Call Light" System. This vital component of meeting

resident needs recently failed and had to be replaced. The \$62,000 price tag was a shocker. Thankfully, the installation was completed just ahead of Mayflower's recent state inspection, which found "no deficiencies" and supported a 5-Star rating.

Kiesel Theatre Seats. The Theatre is a Mayflower essential for gathering and entertainment. However, its seating is aging and lacking in comfort and accessibility. With a generous \$5,000 gift from the Mayflower Residents Association, another \$7,500 is needed to complete this replacement project.

Ongoing Mission Objectives

Book Reviews

Iron Lake by William Kent Krueger

Iron Lake is the first in a series of books featuring former sheriff, Cork O'Connor, set in Aurora in northern Minnesota, adjacent to the Anishinaabe Indian reservation. Cork is part Irish and part Anishinaabe and was the local sheriff. His wife, Jo, became a successful advocate for tribal rights. Now, Cork has lost his job and is separated from his wife and three children. But a missing teen and the murder of a prominent, wealthy judge, find Cork drawn into the mystery of what actually happened and why. This is the 20th anniversary edition of *Iron Lake*, and it includes the added bonus of a short story featuring Cork O'Connor.

Demon Copperhead by Barbara Kingsolver

Many generations ago, Charles Dickens wrote *David Copperfield* from his experience as a survivor of institutional poverty and its damage to children in his society. Those problems have yet to be solved in our society. Dickens is not a prerequisite for readers of this novel, but he provided its inspiration. In transposing that epic novel to her own place and time, Kingsolver has enlisted David's anger and compassion, and, above all, his faith in the transformative powers of a good story.

Demon Copperhead is a boy born to a teenage single mother in a singlewide trailer with no assets beyond his dead father's good looks and copper-colored hair, a caustic wit, and a fierce talent for survival. In a plot that never pauses for breath relayed in his own unsparing voice, Demon braves the modern perils of foster care, child labor, derelict schools, athletic success, addiction, disastrous loves, and crushing losses. Through all of it, he reckons with his own invisibility in a popular culture where even the superheroes have abandoned rural people in favor of cities.

A Pulitzer Prize winner and an Oprah's Book Club pick, *Demon Copperhead* is a masterpiece of contemporary American fiction. It captures the heart as it evokes a young hero's unforgettable journey to maturity in the mountains of southern Appalachia.
